

#### **UELMA Awards**

Three outstanding educators were granted awards at the 2016 UELMA conference.



Marianne Bates was awar ded Teacher-Librarian of the year. Marianne is amazing. She has been a presenter at many conferences, sharing her teaching and technology skills. She has launched a school wiki with over three hundred thousand views. She set up a district wiki where she shares media literacy and links for incorporating the Common Core standards to the library program. In addition, she has been a board member and webmaster for Children's Literature Association. Through skilled grant writing and innovative projects, Marianne was key to acquiring over \$60,000 in grants for Albion Middle School. Others have said of Marianne, "If I could be half the librarian (she) is, I would feel like my career has made a difference in the world." And, "Marianne is one of the finest librarians I know.

**Shelley Nordick** was awarded as an Outstanding Administrator. Shelley has worked tirelessly to provide media specialists with fun and meaningful professional development opportunities. She has arranged for a close partnership with local public librarians so that they and the librarians in the district can share resources and information. In so many ways, Shelley has been an advocate for our profession. She has served on committees and given great input for the state core standards. Her great leadership skills enable her to work with those in decision making positions to understand the needs of librarians, promote their work, and publicize their contributions. Others have said of her, "Shelley is a creative visionary with attention to detail."



Lawni Hamblin was awarded Outstanding Paraprofessional Librarian. Lawni has been referred to as the "book whisperer" at Bluff Ridge Elementary. She works her magic with students and helps even the most reluctant, struggling reader find the one book that opens a world of magic to that student. Besides working with students, Lawni works tirelessly with the community to make her library open and available to families. Lawni's school is a year round school. When it closes for a few weeks, Lawni still makes time to open the library. She supports the community and works with business partners to enhance her library collection. Her administrator said of her, "I have never seen a librarian who is more approachable, more caring or more concerned about a person, small or big, finding the love of reading."

#### **Little Free Library Grant Winners**

We have two winners of the grant for Little Free Libraries this year.

The first is **Dana Valencia** of Oakridge Elementary in Granite District. "With new ESL families moving into the neighborhood a Little Free Library would help with additional reading materials, and aid in building a stronger community," Dana said in her application. We wish her the best of luck in getting this project up and running. What a lucky community they are to have her.





LeAnne Evans is our second awardee, hailing from the book desert of Midway Elementary in Midway, Utah. Here's the reason she feels they need a Little Free Library: "The small rural community of Midway City in Wasatch County is a close community. There is a community library in the neighboring city, Heber City. However with a Little Free Library in our little town the students can still have the opportunity to pick up a book while parents run errands in Midway without making a trip into Heber. The students love taking home a book to read and read again. It would be great to get this set up in time for summer vacation so students can still access books to read while parents run errands and pick up groceries."

#### **Summer Reading Program**





Every summer, libraries all across Utah participate in the Summer Reading Program. 2016 themes are "On your mark, get set…READ!" for children and "Get in the Game READ" for teens.

In addition, Utah State Library and Utah Educational Savings Plan (UESP) are partnering to provide an opportunity for parents/guardians to enter their children, who participate in their local library's summer reading program, in a sweepstakes for a \$1,000 UESP scholarship. Entitled "Book Your Summer," the sweepstakes runs from June 1 - August 15.

Along with the summer reading program, public librarians support the literacy efforts of school librarians by encouraging lifelong reading by providing access to books, eBooks, audiobooks, internet, computers and literacy based programming.

Student participation in the summer reading program can prevent summer reading loss and offers advantages for struggling and/or reluctant readers.

- -Numerous studies have shown that reading over the summer prevents "summer reading loss."
- -Summer reading loss is cumulative. Non-readers don't "catch up" in fall because readers are moving ahead with their skills.
- -Reading for pleasure, whether it be books, graphic novels or magazines, builds children's confidence as learners and enhances their formal education.

Contact your local public library for more information about its summer reading program and the Book Your Summer sweepstakes. By working together, school and public libraries can help close the summer reading loss gap.


#### **Thank You**

#### **Library Media Program at SUU**

The Library Media Program at SUU is a flexibly-designed program designed to meet the needs of our busy students. It is currently the only entirely online Library Media endorsement program in the state of Utah and students may enroll any semester. After completing the LM endorsement though SUU, as well as the Praxis exam, students are qualified to apply for the Utah State Office of Education (USOE) Library Media K-12 endorsement. The program consists of six core courses taught by our library faculty which meet the requirements for the state of Utah. However, to meet the needs of our expanding program, we added a new class last year to accommodate out-of-state students who are required to have more than 18 credits to receive their LM endorsement. The Library Media program at SUU has undergone a shift in personnel this year, with the addition of new faculty positions including a User-Experience Librarian and an Early-Experience Librarian. The past program director, Steve Irving, has taken a position in Northern California and we wish him all the best in his new undertaking. Adventures with Waffles by Maria Parr – It's summer vacation and life in miniscule Mathildewick Cove is anything but dull when next-door neighbors/best friends, Lena and Trille, are on the prowl. The two can create altogether too much excitement in their Norwegian fishing village. An innocent Sunday school lesson, a Midsummer celebration, a sheep roundup, and a simple row in the bay all take on an edge of humor and panic. Mortal jeopardy, concussions, boatloads of animals, and raining manure follow in their wake. A tale that feels both traditional and current, foreign and domestic. We are introduced to a young hero and heroine whose antics alternately cause us to cringe with dismay, giggle with inappropriate glee, and melt with buttery satisfaction. Fantastic read aloud for third grade and up.

In the end the three don't find their dreams, but dreams manage to come true. Three unforgettable souls who form an unlikely friendship and end up saving each other. This is Kate Dicamillo at her best. Best read under the summer sun in bare feet.
